

Quick Tips



Height Matters

Pick a high, dry spot to avoid flooding, have good drainage and avoid pests



Airflow

Think about airflow and weather: vents or windows should open



Sturdy Materials

Use solid, easy-to-clean flooring and locking latches to block predators



Think About Sunlight

Face windows and runs south for sun in winter and shade in summer



Weather

Insulate well to protect birds in heat and cold



Run Space

Attach protected roaming space to the coop for birds to feel more relaxed


Fun Facts

Egg Production

Hens produce 5-6 eggs per week during their first two years of peak production.

Light Lovers

Hens need 12-14 hours of light daily – a simple bulb works in winter.

Coop Prep

1. Keep a Clean Coop

- Scrub perches, floors, and boxes often. Keep coop clean and dry.

2. Choose a Dry Spot

- Build on high, well-drained ground to avoid standing water, odors, and flies.

2. Bedding & Supplies

- Use 2–3 in. clean, dry bedding. Provide 1 feeder and 1 waterer per 6–8 birds.

3. Watch Behavior

- Calm birds eat, drink, and roost normally. Huddling, panting, or pecking shows heat, cold, or crowding problems.

Bird Spacing

1. Chickens

- 2–4 sq ft coop, 8–10 sq ft run

2. Bantams

- Slightly less than chicken measurements

3. Turkeys

- 6–10 sq ft coop, 15+ sq ft run

4. Predator Protection

- 4–6 sq ft coop, 10–15 sq ft run

Basic Coop Setup

1. Roosts

- 8–10 inches per bird. Set higher and away from nest boxes to keep eggs clean.

2. Ventilation + Light

- Windows or vents = fresh air + fewer health issues.

3. Nesting Boxes

- Provide 1 box for every 3–5 hens. Mount boxes lower and away from roosts, and add 2–3 inches of clean bedding.

4. Predator Protection

- Use secure latches, hardware cloth and bury fencing to keep out any predators.

3 Main Elements

1. Outdoor Run

- Room to scratch, dust bathe peck, and exercise safely.
- Use half inch hardware cloth (**not chicken wire**) for predator protection.

2. Secure Coop

- A dry, ventilated space for sleeping and predator protection.
- Adding a lock to the door will help keep it secure

3. Nesting Boxes

- Place boxes for easy egg collection. External hatches make gathering quick and low stress.
